In 2016, FaceBook connected me with Cecilia, who I had enlisted with. Cecilia asked me to accompany her to meetings and in November 2016, I joined the Sub-Section, thanks to Wendy's recruiting.

In late 2017, Wendy asked me to be the Treasurer, and long story short, I am still the Treasurer as no-one else wants the role.

At the end of my first year as Treasurer, I introduced electronic recording in MYOB to the Sub-Section. All the receipts are now produced from MYOB and all payments are by electronic transfer.

The Sub-Section used to meet at Newmarket, then we moved to the Clayfield Toombul RSL premises. All of the Sub-Section's belongings at Newmarket were boxed and stored at various members premises.

COVID forced a change to our thinking, and we changed our meetings to the Geebung RSL premises.

I eventually collected all of the Sub-Section belongings together and sorted them. Anything belonging to 'Service Time' is on display downstairs in the Geebung RSL foyer. This includes two sets of medals which were in our

belongings. They have been framed and are in the display case.

Anything of our history, which is on display here, was set aside and stored separately. There is a cupboard to display these items as well, if we had somewhere to display it.

Anything of financial and admin matters were sorted for more action later.

During late 2020, I became interested in our WWII veterans, as I was sorting the accounting and admin papers. I was intrigued by who they were, why two of them left "us" their medals, what they did in the WRANS, what they did in the Sub-Section, and what they did after they left the WRANS.

The two charters are included in our history, and I realised our 60th anniversary was coming up. I offered to write the history of the Sub-Section and the members of the Sub-Section.

I started researching the women who formed the Sub-Section at the initial meeting, 60 years ago, the ones who joined during 1964 and the WWII veterans. Four of the members who joined in 1964 are members at this time.

In 2023, when the Sub-Section agreed to give me access to their membership register for the members names, dates of membership and achievements, I expanded my research to the post war era, 1950-1969s, and included the women from the modern era.

I used information freely available on the Internet to write these chapters.

Margie Gadd offered help with our current members, which I gladly accepted. She did the questionnaire, and I thank those who responded to her. Margie transcribed the responses into stories, which I was able to copy and paste into the appropriate sections. Thanks Margie for all the time you took to help this project.

Liz Grimes mentioned the name for the book, and I liked it. Thanks Liz.

Our Life Members, Judy Hunter, Barbara Snowdon and Wendy Griggs, helped with the WWII Sections, ensuring I did not miss anything of importance to the Sub-Section.



At the start of Navy Week in Brisbane, HMAS Moreton performed Beat to Quarters and Ceremonial Sunset. The event was held in front of the Brisbane City Hall. Thankfully, this year, it did not rain. Beat to Quarters and Ceremonial Sunset are traditions the Navy perform on ceremonial occasions.

Beat to Quarters, way back in the day, occurred when ships went to battle stations in the days of sail. A particular type of drum roll would summon sailors to their posts where some sailors would man the cannons and the marines would ascend the rigging as sharpshooters.

The Sunset Ceremony is another tradition Australia has continued to perform from the Royal Navy (dating back to the 17th century). Each evening, the Colours are lowered at sunset on all shore establishments and ships alongside.

In April 1941, the fist women started working for the Navy as members of the *Women's Emergency Signalling Corps*. On 1 October 1942, they were enlisted into the WRANS with a seniority of the day they started working for the Navy. By the end of WWII, there were over 3,140 members who joined. A handful are still alive.

Where do they rest? Some are in Arlington National Cemetery, more in the USA, Greece, Canada, UK and New Zealand, many are here in Australia.

A group of Navy Women are researching and recording what we can find for all Australian Navy Women,

anywhere in the world. Joan, Carol, Tania and Lorrae need your help to record the resting palces of our sisters who paved the way for us younger ones. This project includes ALL Australian Navy Women from 1941 until now.

Cadets with Pat Nuss

I was appointed NAA/ANC Liaison by NAA Qld State office in July 2022 as part of upholding the 4th Pillar of the NAA Constitution - Cadets. I do this by visiting each unit once a year where possible and keeping in contact via email. The main aim is to assess which ANC units are supported by NAA Sub-Sections, RSLs or ESOs, and identify those units with little or no local support and linking them with NAA Sub-Sections with financial capacity to provide funding to a cadet unit in need.

I have been warmly welcomed by all cadet units I have visited and they are very proud of their cadets.

In 2023, NWOld Sub-Sections donated \$250.00 each to TS' Onslow, Tyalgum, Walrus, Kookaburra, Toowoomba, Brisbane, Vampire and NTS Vengeance.

In 2023, our Sub-Section raised \$1,000 in funding for cadets in 2024 and I have already had discussions with four cadet units about their funding needs. This funding comes from our Cash for Containers drive and is donated to support their Anzac Day activities.

Many cadet units are struggling for staff, especially ex RAN members, to support them either as part of occasional specialist training (eg knots) or joining a cadet unit as a permanent ANC staff member. Another option is to become a Defence Authorised Helper (DAH) at a cadet unit. They especially need female DAHs as they can't allow female cadets to parade if there is no female staff member/DAH in attendance on that day.

Commanding Officer Handover

It was a very hot day for the Handover of Command at HMAS Moreton. CMDR Fiona Southwood's tenure as Commanding Officer HMAS Moreton had come to an end. CMDR Southwood, during her tenure as CO of HMAS Moreton, attended a number of Navy Women events and also became a financial member. All the best, Fiona, in your new venture.

The Commanding Officer of HMAS Moreton was officially handed over on 6 December 2023, and Navy Women Qld along with NAA(Q) State officers and other Sub-Sections were there to witness it.

A small number of Navy Women Qld attended the Handover of Command. CMDR Rosemarie Apikotoa took up the reins of Command from CMDR Southwood in December 2023. CMDR Apikotoa was the first Officer of Polynesian descent to gain an Ocean Navigation Certificate and Bridge Warfare Certificate to drive Australian Warships at Sea. After the Navy Recruiting Team visited my High School during my senior year, my classmates dared me to join. Eventually I was accepted and enlisted. I was awarded the "Most Outstanding Recruit" of class 168.

I competed in Interservice Basketball for several years.

On April Fool's Day, I posted into HMAS Albatross at AJASS. Those two years were my fun years. I could not believe I was being paid to have fun. I managed to get many flights in choppers, and I even got to fly one. I also went to HMNZS Philomel for two weeks of lectures.

In 1981, I posted back to HMAS Watson to RANTACS and promoted to LWRRP. Now that posting turned out to be my favorite work posting and I received "Commanding Officers Commendation" for what I did.

In January 1985, I was posted back to *Cerberus*. Bob had picked up his WO's and was going back as the Boss. My posting had me going as Quarter Master. I decided I would be the first QM in Court Shoes. The XO was none other than Paul Gilmore-Walsh, Helen's husband. He offered me a proposition I couldn't refuse. If I became Secretary of the Welfare Committee, I wouldn't have to keep any duties. Deal was done.

I ended up working in the Bosuns Store, which entailed doing nothing all day. One day, I decided to deliver the curtains to the XO's residence myself where I met Helen and spent several hours having many laughs and cups of tea. Two days later I was summoned to the XOs office and after a very one-sided discussion, I found myself working for him and ended up loving that job.

I was invited / conned into going to Divisions as a guest of a WOQMG who was changing over to SD Officer and it was his last one. As I was on maternity leave, I couldn't figure out WHY!!!!

CDRE Toss Dadswell, NOIC VIC (he was also CO of NAS Nowra when Bob and I were there and another one of Bob's drinking mates) turned up. It seemed I was receiving another Commendation. I was trying to figure out what the protocols were when you're NOT in uniform, instead of just a handshake; I ended up getting a kiss instead.

After returning from maternity leave, I was posted to the recruit school, and was promoted to Provisional POWRRP, where I did all the course programming.

After my second child was born, I took my discharge and we moved to where I still live today. My children are now fully grown and my daughter has two sons of her own, and a career in the Army.

Lorrae found me again and we now meet up regularly with other RP's, friends I knew "back then", and friends I've met since.

My Navy days were the best days because of the people I met along the way. My best friends today, are the ones I met 45+ years ago in the TTB at HMAS Watson.

2024 Committee Member – Rosemary van Dijk

I joined the Navy from Melbourne at the age of 18 in 1987, as a Writer. I wanted to join earlier but the policy of the day was women had to be 18 years of age upon enlistment, 'men' could join up at 16 years of age, which meant a lot of us girls took the younger lads under our wing.

Prior to joining the Navy, I was a public servant at Department of Defence at 350 St Kilda Road and Victoria Barracks which was a lot of fun, especially the long lunches at the Clarendon Pub in South Melbourne, I learnt a lot of admin and clerical skills which helped when I joined the Navy.

I was posted to HMAS Kuttabul and worked in the beautiful Maritime Headquarters in with the fabulous views of the harbour and ships alongside at Garden Island. Then I was selected to work as the Principal Chaplains Secretary at Garden Island and had a great time organising them and being part of their community. Although I stressed out poor Principal Chaplain Dempsey from time to time when I would leave work with brown hair on the Friday and come in on the Monday with either blonde, black or purple hair...I think the purple almost broke him (and the Coxswains but that's another story).

At lunchtimes I would lead aerobics classes for the sailors at the Woolloomooloo fleet base wharf gym (now luxury apartments). I loved putting the 80s music and leg warmers on and getting a bunch of hairy sailors running around and sweating it out. I was going to change over to PTI however I broke my femur and ended up in HMAS Penguin where I languished for three months. This hospital stay changed everything for me unfortunately. I was sexually abused by a medical officer whilst a patient at the Penguin hospital, I made multiple formal complaints but was dismissed and not believed.

As a result, I eventually left the Navy and married a sailor I met at Garden Island and moved to Nowra. I worked at the Nowra Community Health Centre and at HMAS Albatross as Captains Secretary - Naval Air Systems Programme Office (NASPO). I became a single mum and studied a Bachelor of Arts (Women's Studies and Sociology) whilst working. I then met and remarried (ex-Raafie) Piet and moved to Canberra. Among many public service roles I undertook, being a policy officer at Defence Equity and Diversity on Women's, LGBTIQ+ and Indigenous policy was a real highlight, where I felt I could make a difference for serving women.

I went through the Defence Abuse Response Taskforce (DART) and received an apology from the Navy for the former abuse, which was pivotal to my 'embracing' my Navy experience as a positive and joining the WRANS' Association in Canberra. My husband, daughter Lauren and I moved to Brisbane in 2022, where I now work fulltime for the Department of Health and Aged Care.

This Sub-Section has been so welcoming, supportive and friendly and I am so happy to now be a Committee Member where I hope to contribute to the fabulous and amazing Queensland group. Thank you.

Care Wellbeing with Cath Leung Members Update

THE WOMEN'S ROYAL AUSTRALIAN NAVAL SERVICE 1941-47 By Graham Caldwell Member, Royal Naval Association, Port Philip Bay Branch, Victoria

'What! Women in the Royal Australian Navy', so begins the first chapter of WRANS published by the Naval Historical Society of Australia, which continues: 'if women wanted to dress up and do something to help the war effort, they could work in a canteen or a factory, or stay in a women's proper place: the home, or so thought male officialdom: fortunately many women realised that sooner or later every able-bodied person would be needed if Australia was to keep her place in the sun'. At the outbreak of war, the services realised that they were desperately short of wireless telegraphists: cue 50-year-old Violet Florence McKenzie, affectionately known as Mrs. Mac, who created the Women's Emergency Signalling Corps (WESC) in 1939 to train women in telegraphy to free up men for war service.

In 1940 McKenzie wrote to the Royal Australian Navy (RAN) Minister, Billy Hughes: 'I would like to offer the services of 120 members of our Signalling Corps as telegraphists, but if not acceptable, then as instructors to men ratings'. Dismissed by the minister, Commander Jack Newman RAN, Director of Signals and Communication, visited WESC to test Mrs. Mac's trainees. Finding they were highly proficient; he recommended the navy admit them. Hughes continued with his prejudiced stance until McKenzie threatened to take her offer to the Royal Australian Air Force instead. The urgent need for trained telegraphists prevailed and, on the 21 April 1941, Hughes finally authorised the entry of the women to work within the RAN on condition that no publicity be accorded to break with its male tradition! However, due to the RAN's reluctance to accept women, the authorities prevaricated, resulting in the women not being officially sworn-in as enlisted personnel until 1 October 1942, which date is regarded as the official formation of the WRANS, when the telephonists discarded their WESC forest green uniforms for WRANS navy blue.

The Cinderella service

The WRANS was the smallest of the three women's services, with 124 officers and 2,338 ratings at its peak in March 1944, but was nevertheless 10% of the RAN. With over 1,000 WRANS on the books by the end of 1942, it's difficult to understand why no consideration was given to provide for WRAN commissioned officers, the organisation's supervision resting with the Director of Naval Reserves and Mobilisation, a male commodore; nor was a patron of influence appointed as honorary commandant, as was the custom with the other two services.

In 1942, King's Regulations provided no guidance on how to deal with females. Most of the recruits were aged between 18 and 23, never having lived away from home before. In the tricky situation during the earliest Wran medical examinations, a male sick berth attendant questioned: "can you pee into this bottle?" whilst being met with blank stares as he handed out pear-shaped receptacles and turned his back! On another occasion, the obligatory chest expansion measurement, which required girls to breathe in deeply, caused a stir when the standard tape measure ran out on a well-endowed Wran. Finally, on 18 January 1943, the decision was taken to open the first female naval officer's course at HMAS Cerberus in Flinders Victoria, followed by 16 further courses completed by September 1945. On the initial course was civilian barrister Shelia McClemans, who enlisted a month earlier as a Wran rating, but whose brilliance and organising skills were immediately recognised. Enjoying rapid promotion, she was appointed Director WRANS in August 1944 in the rank of First Officer (later Chief Officer) but still one rank lower than her woman counterparts in the army and air force. Her services to the Woman's Royal Australian Naval Service was recognised in 1951 with the Order of the British Empire (OBE).

With so many women wishing to enlist, but so few places, the need to advertise was unnecessary: for example, the WRANS did not publish a recruiting poster, although an image of a Wran was tacked onto the end of a line of six uniformed women in a 1943 poster 'Join Us in a Victory Job'. Janet Allport remembers that she selected the navy in preference to the woman's army or air force out of vanity: 'the navy was the Senior Service; I liked the uniform and the thought working near the sea would provide opportunities to surf when off duty: how wrong I was! We were not allowed to serve afloat or overseas; even employment as small boat crews was forbidden'. By August 1942, a minority of farsighted male officers began to see that the benefit of employing women would be to release men for sea service, for example, the Commodore Superintendent of Training at HMAS Cerberus said that 400 qualified Wrans could usefully be absorbed at the depot.

Not just telegraphists

A breakthrough occurred in July 1942, when the RAN allowed Wrans to be employed as car drivers, writers, supply ratings and 'Gunnery Girls' (rifle-range wardens).
